

**To the Honorable Members of the United States House of Representatives and United States Senate,**

**Subject:** Request for the Formation of a Subcommittee on the Weaponization of the Justice System

**Dear Members,**

I am writing to express deep concerns regarding systemic issues within our justice system that have far-reaching implications for all Americans, regardless of political affiliation. As a direct participant in the Bundy Ranch case and a victim of prosecutorial and law enforcement misconduct, I urge Congress to take immediate action by forming a subcommittee specifically focused on the weaponization of the justice system.

The creation of the "Select Subcommittee on the Weaponization of the Federal Government" was a commendable step, providing necessary oversight of government abuses. However, the broad scope of its investigations risks diluting its effectiveness. A narrower, more focused subcommittee dedicated solely to the justice system is critical for identifying specific reforms, restoring public trust, and protecting constitutional rights.

**The Justice System in Crisis**

The justice system is one of the foundational pillars of American democracy. Its impartiality is vital for maintaining public trust and ensuring the rule of law. Yet, cases like mine—and many others—expose troubling patterns of systemic abuse, including:

**1. Prosecutorial Misconduct:**

Prosecutors have been found to knowingly present false information, suppress exculpatory evidence, and pursue convictions at any cost, violating due process.

In my case, prosecutors misrepresented facts to grand juries and trial juries, suppressing evidence such as the Wooten memos, which revealed bias and misconduct by law enforcement officials.

**2. Weaponized Law Enforcement:**

Agencies tasked with upholding the law have, at times, engaged in unconstitutional surveillance, suppression of dissent, and other coercive practices.

In the Bundy Ranch case, federal agents used excessive force, manipulated evidence, and denied fundamental rights—all while shielding their own misconduct.

**3. Erosion of Public Trust:**

These abuses undermine confidence in the impartiality of the justice system. Citizens across the political spectrum now question whether the system serves justice or entrenched interests.

This erosion of trust is not a partisan issue but a systemic one that threatens the legitimacy of democratic institutions.

## **A Nonpartisan Problem Requiring Nonpartisan Solutions**

This is not about one political party or ideology. Both conservative ranchers at Bundy Ranch and progressive activists in protests against police brutality have faced similar allegations of overreach and misconduct. The justice system, as an institution, must remain impartial and independent. Weaponizing it for political, ideological, or institutional gain poses a threat to all Americans, regardless of their beliefs.

### **Why a Focused Subcommittee is Necessary**

The existing "Weaponization of Government" subcommittee tackles a wide range of issues, but its broad scope risks diluting its impact. The justice system warrants focused attention for several reasons:

#### 1. Complexity and Specificity:

Issues such as Brady violations, prosecutorial misconduct, and systemic abuses by law enforcement require specialized knowledge and a distinct focus.

A dedicated subcommittee would have the bandwidth to explore these issues in depth, without competing priorities.

#### 2. Bipartisan Relevance:

Concerns about the justice system transcend party lines. A focused subcommittee could foster bipartisan cooperation by addressing issues that affect everyone.

#### 3. Clearer Reform Pathways:

By narrowing the scope, Congress can produce targeted, actionable recommendations, such as:

- Reforms to the Brady standard to ensure timely disclosure of exculpatory evidence.
- Stronger accountability mechanisms for prosecutors and law enforcement officials.
- Protections for whistleblowers who expose misconduct.

### **Broader Implications for Democracy**

The failure to address systemic abuses within the justice system risks entrenching a two-tiered system of justice—one for the powerful and another for the vulnerable. Such a system erodes the principles of equality and accountability upon which this nation was founded. By addressing these issues, Congress can reaffirm its commitment to upholding the Constitution and safeguarding the rights of all Americans.

### ***Specific Recommendations for the Subcommittee***

#### 1. Investigative Scope:

Focus exclusively on systemic issues within the justice system, including prosecutorial misconduct, law enforcement overreach, and judicial accountability.

## 2. Bipartisan Membership:

Ensure equal representation from both parties to promote nonpartisan cooperation and trust.

## 3. Public Hearings and Transparency:

Conduct public hearings to restore faith in the justice system and provide a platform for whistleblowers, victims, and experts.

## 4. Legislative Focus:

Recommend specific reforms, such as independent oversight bodies, stricter disclosure requirements under Brady, and enhanced protections for whistleblowers.

The issues within our justice system are not abstract; they are real and affect the lives of countless Americans. The abuses I experienced in the Bundy Ranch case are emblematic of broader systemic problems that demand immediate attention. Congress has a unique opportunity to lead by forming a focused subcommittee on the weaponization of the justice system.

This is not just about fixing the problems of the past but about preserving the integrity of the justice system for future generations. By taking this step, Congress can ensure that the promise of "equal justice under the law" is not an empty ideal but a lived reality for all Americans.
